Chevron's Australian subsidiary is the sole oil and gas operator on Barrow Island with both onshore and offshore operations.

Barrow Island was designated as a Class A Nature Reserve in 1910, the highest level of environmental protection offered by the Western Australian government.

Our goal was to develop an effective plan to protect the island and its waters' unique ecosystems from alien invasive species. The survival of these species depends on the continued absence of predators and competitors from the surrounding area.

Beginning in 1964, Chevron partnered with the late renowned naturalist Dr. Harry

Butler to create a scalable management process that could integrate with the company's Operational Excellence Management System.

Over the course of the next five decades, a rigorous quarantine process evolved into the quarantine management system (QMS), which now applies to the Barrow Island oilfield operations and Gorgon, one of the world's largest natural gas developments.
